


candles complement the warmth started at your front door. And the best part of all of this....it's all natural! No storage needed at the end of the season!

HURRICANE ISABEL

Hurricane Isabel may not have been the strongest, most expensive or the most destructive hurricane ever but it is certainly going to be remembered a long time on Kent Island and the surrounding areas. Isabel flooded may homes and businesses, left many cars and trucks stranded and caused major power outages. According to John Chew, director of the Queen Anne's County Department of Emergency Services, "It was a record-breaker in terms of the storm surge". In 1933 the record for the highest surge was 5 1/2 feet which was recently topped by Isabel's 6 1/2' surges. Many trees were uprooted or blown over and various vehicles and boats were damaged or destroyed. One specific sailboat came into contact with an overhead power line just off of Route 50 (Eastbound) and triggered a fire that consumed the boat. Standing water remained in many communities in the area until Friday. For example Route 8 at the Bay City entrance was closed off until late Friday afternoon. A prized landmark The Romancoke Pier at the end of Route 8 was was ripped apart by the storm with pieces floating around the area after the storm.

FEMA is already accepting applications for federal disaster aid for individuals, families and business. This aid will grant temporary housing and repair. However, FEMA suggest that if you have flood insurance to call you insurance company before calling FEMA. The application number for FEMA is 1-800-621-3362.

The aftermath of Isabel will live on much longer that the storm itself did. Much rebuilding or repairing can be expected in the coming months. John Chew is concerned with the strain that is now put on the water and sewer plants. "There is just so much liquid in the system right now because of the flooding that pumps and other equipment are getting burned out and need replacement,". It is asked that everyone use good judgment when using all resources, especially with laundry and dishwashers. Health officials suggest homeowners disinfect their wells before using the water due to the contamination from the flood waters. To support any disaster areas, visit www.nvoad.org.

FALL REMINDERS

- For Forced air systems: Clean or replace filters monthly. Hot Water Heat: Check zone valves and pumps.
- 2. Check to make sure your humidifier is cleaned and working monthly if you own one.
- 3. Turn Off exterior faucets. Disconnect and store all outdoors hoses. This should be done before the first frost.
- 4. Close windows in the locked position. Store screens for the winter. You may want to clean your windows at this time.
- 5. Make sure the damper works and chimney draws. Clean flue and spark arrestor.
- 6. Clean gutters and downspouts after the leaves have fallen and before the first snow. Clogging causes ice dams, leaks and roof damage. Leaf guards are available for gutters.
- 7. If your insulated glass fogs, between panes, replace it. Check exterior door thresholds for adjustment.
- 8. Close up all crawl space vents, placing temporary insulation in openings from inside. This is very important to maintain crawl space temperature above freezing, and prevent waterline freezeups.
- 9. Read instructions before lighting pilot on gas fireplaces.

Gardening & Lawncare Tips


It's time to winterize your lawn and garden again!

- Use a good fall weed and feed fertilizer on your lawn so that in the spring when your lawn comes back it will have less weeds.
- It also helps to overseed your lawn at this time. A thick lawn kills weeds.
- As your plants go dormant it helps to cut them back to start fresh in the spring.
- Another good idea is to mark their location in case you want to add to your beds in the spring so as not to damage existing perennial bulbs.
- You should rake the beds to mix the mulch in to help enrich the soil as the mulch biodegrades into the soil. If you want to transplant trees, shrubs or flowers. Be sure they are completely dormant before doing so as to not kill them. The best time is between December 15th and February 15th for transplanting.
- Don't forget to move your gardening tools and ornaments inside as to prevent rust and other damage. Gas Grills should also be moved inside sheds, basements or garages to keep burners tanks etc... from rusting remember winter is hard everything.



Why do we celebrate Halloween?

Halloween, or Allhallows Eve, obtains its name because it was the evening after the Christian feast of Allhallows, or All Saints' Day.
